MINUTES OF MENDOTA SPECIAL CITY COUNCIL MEETING

Special Meeting October 19, 2017

Meeting called to order by Mayor Castro 5:06 p.m.

Roll Call

Council Members Present: Mayor Rolando Castro, Councilors Jesse

Mendoza, Oscar Rosales (at 5:16 p.m.), and

Robert Silva.

Council Members Absent: Mayor Pro Tem Victor Martinez.

FINALIZE THE AGENDA

A motion was made by Councilor Silva to adopt the agenda, seconded by Councilor Mendoza; unanimously approved (3 ayes, absent: Martinez and Rosales).

PRESENTATION

1. Council receive presentation from a cannabis cultivation company interested in leasing/purchasing City-owned property near the Wastewater Treatment Plant.

Randi Knott, Government Affairs Director for Genezen, gave the history of her career; stated that Sacramento has had 30 dispensaries since 2009; provided an overview of the company; the company's pursuit of a state license; currently building campuses in the state; the environmental philosophy of the company; their approach to the industry, including the different parts of cannabis production; their business model; their approach to local employment; community benefits they will provide (at 5:16 p.m.

Councilor Rosales entered the Council Chambers); and showed an artist's rendering of the proposed campus.

Discussion was held on how Genezen located the City of Mendota; the amount and classes of jobs that will be available; details on the security; distribution and logistics chains; how the water is going to be used and re-used; the Mendota ordinance that regulates the production of cannabis; Genezen enforcing regulations when they lease out land to other companies, should they come to Mendota; how any fees will be collected, including the Council's desire to have one "clearinghouse" that ensures all cannabis producers pay and remits one payment to the City; the purpose of the campus model in helping smaller businesses rent space and succeed; problems related to fires in Northern California that are causing issues in the cannabis business; the fact that staff has not heard from this company until now; the proposed size of the project; the wages of potential employees; the different phases Genezen would build out; the funding the Genezen has through private funders and its willingness to divulge who those funders are as part of a written agreement; and the interest from other parties on the land the City owns.

Council provided direction to have representatives from Genezen meet with the subcommittee.



MINUTES OF MENDOTA REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING

Regular Meeting October 24, 2017

Meeting called to order by Mayor Castro at 6:03 p.m.

Roll Call

A motion was made by Councilor Silva to adopt the agenda, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Martinez; unanimously approved (5 ayes).

CITIZENS ORAL AND WRITTEN PRESENTATIONS

Sergio Valdez (Mendota Youth Recreation [MYR]) – stated that MYR received an invoice for police services for the Harvest Fiesta; stated that he was under the impression that all city fees related to the carnival were waived; stated that he spoke to the City Manager regarding the issue; and summarized the minutes of the March 14, 2017 Council meeting.

Discussion was held on whether MYR needed to pay for police services for the Harvest Fiesta and the Red Ribbon Week carnival; the fees that were waived; whether the invoice is still outstanding; the amount of security officers that MYR contracted for the

carnival; and Council directed staff to look into the issue to determine what fees were waived, and whether MYR needs to pay for contracted police services.

Kevin Romero (160 Tuft Street) – provided an update on Mendota High School Aztec football, and summarized the impact that moving to Division IV has had on the team.

Council thanked Mr. Romero for the update.

Bryn Forhan (The Forhan Company) – stated that she works with the coalition of Californians for Energy Independence; invited the Council to attend a competition where students will design a campaign promoting tech jobs in energy at Firebaugh High School; and summarized the workshops that 59DaysOfCode is hosting for high school students; and stated the importance of promoting STEM career opportunities.

Discussion was held on various events that Californians for Energy Independence sponsors; the benefits of the students participating in such events; and the Council thanked Ms. Forhan for her hard work.

Councilor Silva inquired on when the minutes of the special City Council meeting of October 19th would be considered for approval.

A motion was made by Councilor Silva to approve items 1 and 2, seconded by Councilor Mendoza; unanimously approved (5 ayes).

- 2. Proposed adoption of **Resolution No. 17-57**, authorizing the conveyance of a 2,599-square foot parcel to KSA Investments to complete the boundary of Las Palmas Map Phase 9, in exchange for conveyance of a 37,300- square foot parcel to the City of Mendota.

A request was made to pull item 2 for discussion.

A motion was made by Councilor Rosales to adopt item 1 of the Consent Calendar, seconded by Councilor Mendoza; unanimously approved (5 ayes).

2. Proposed adoption of **Resolution No. 17-57**, authorizing the conveyance of a 2,599-square foot parcel to KSA Investments to complete the boundary of Las Palmas Map Phase 9, in exchange for conveyance of a 37,300- square foot parcel to the City of Mendota.

Discussion was held on the possibility of tabling the item until the next meeting so that the City Manager could be present to answer questions that the Council may have; the reasons behind the proposed transferring of property; the agreement being null and void if KSA investments does not exchange the parcel to the city within a certain timeframe; the timeframe of exchanging the parcels; the location of the subject properties; and whether a small portion of road will open to traffic on Black Street.

A motion was made by Mayor Pro Tem Martinez to adopt item 2 of the Consent Calendar, seconded by Councilor Rosales; unanimously approved (5 ayes).

BUSINESS

1. Council discussion and consideration of **Resolution No. 17-61**, cancelling the November 28th and December 26th regular City Council meetings, and authorizing the City Manager to execute any necessary warrants.

Mayor Castro introduced the item and Deputy City Clerk Cabrera summarized the report including that staff is requesting that the Council cancel the November 28th and December 26th regular City Council meetings, and that the City Manager be authorized to execute any necessary warrants.

A motion was made by Councilor Silva to adopt Resolution No. 17-61, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Martinez; unanimously approved (5 ayes).

2. Council discussion and consideration of an application from Westside Youth Inc. to allow Cobras Football to use the Benny Mares Sr. Baseball Field for practice.

Mayor Castro introduced the item and Economic Development Manager Flood summarized the report including that Westside Youth (WSY) submitted a request to use the baseball field for Cobra football practice to take advantage of the lights; the days and times that WSY is requesting to use the field; the item not going to the Recreation Commission since the time that WSY is requesting to use the field is before the next regular meeting; the item going to Council for consideration since the Recreation Commission has stated that it wants to limit the use of the field to children's baseball and softball; staff being neutral on the item; and the conditions that staff proposes be added should the Council decide to approve the application.

Discussion was held on the item not going to the Recreation Commission; Cobra football being permitted to use the grass area of the baseball field last year; the conditions that were imposed last year; the importance of the community supporting the

youth; ensuring that WSY reports any issues related to the field to the Public Works Director; dragging the field prior to its use; the proposed conditions that that WSY provide a \$250.00 security deposit, and maintain the field; and Council congratulated Cobra Football for advancing to play-offs.

Rosemary Gomez (Westside Youth, Inc.) – inquired as to when Cobra Football would be able to begin to use the field for practice, and requested that WSY have a week to submit the security deposit.

A motion was made by Councilor Silva to approve the application with the addition of conditions as mentioned by staff, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Martinez; unanimously approved (5 ayes).

 - a) Monthly Report

Administrative Services Director Lekumberry summarized the report including the work that she has been doing for special project management, risk management, and aviation.

Council thanked Director Lekumberry for her work.

- 2. Public Works
 - a) Monthly Report

Planning & Public Works Director Gonzalez summarized the report including an update on the water leak at Bass Avenue, lights issues on Oller Street, 8th Street Reconstruction project, and the 7th Street and Derrick Avenue Beautification project.

Discussion was held on street repairs to various areas in the City; the status of the proposed Taco Bell and clinic; the electric airplane project; the storm drain grant that the city received; and where individuals can dump green waste.

- 3. City Attorney
 - a) Update

City Attorney Kinsey stated that he is working with staff on various issues, and stated that Nic Cardella would be providing training to the Code Enforcement officers.

Discussion was held on whether companies are interested in the Cannabis Overlay District, and staff provided an update on the creation of the RFP for the lease and development of the City's property for cannabis cultivation.

3. City Manager

Finance Director Marguez stated that work has been well.

Councilor Mendoza stated that he has been receiving complaints about road conditions, but has received positive feedback on the work that the police department does and the economic development in the City.

Mayor Pro Tem Martinez stated that the Salvadoran Consulate will be at Gonzalez Hall on October 29th, and thanked the public for attending the meeting.

Councilor Silva provided an update on the Highway 180 passing lanes project; stated that there is a proposed roundabout on Highway 180 and Dickenson Avenue; and reported on a meeting he attended in Sacramento with the water commission.

2. Mayor

Mayor Castro reported on the upcoming Red Ribbon carnival.

1. Proposed adoption of **Resolution No. 17-62**, authorizing staff to publish a Request for Proposals for the lease and development of a City property.

Mayor Castro introduced the item and City Manager DiMaggio summarized his report including the request by Council to bring this Request for Proposals (RFP) to Council for

consideration; the land that is to be leased; the qualifications for leasing the property; and the companies and groups that have been interested in participating in the RFP.

Discussion was held on asking the companies that submit RFP's to present before Council; the exact process that will transpire so Council can make a determination as to which company is the best (at 5:05 p.m. Councilor Rosales entered the Council Chambers); the different elements that make up an RFP; the plan to bring all of the respondents to the whole Council; the desire to modify items in the RFP related to employing a certain amount of employees in Mendota and buying local; the possibility of adding a provision that the selected company would provide funds for the position of an additional police officer; the possibility of requiring companies to contribute to community causes; changing the payment schedule from annually to quarterly; the possibility of granting the lease of the land to two parties; and the possible termination provisions of an agreement with a developer.

Members of the public inquired as to the employment these companies will offer and Mayor Castro instructed them to come to the Council Meeting in December, where the various companies will make a presentation.

A motion was made by Councilor Rosales to adopt Resolution No. 17-62, seconded by Councilor Mendoza; unanimously approved (4 ayes, absent: Martinez).

ISSUE

Should the City Council approve Resolution 17-63 to accept and file the Community Facilities District No. 2006-1 Annual Report for Fiscal Year 2017/18?

BACKGROUND

Community Facilities District No. 2006-1 ("CFD No. 2006-1") was formed by the City on November 28, 2006 and includes properties within Las Palmas Tract 5483, which is generally located west of Hwy 33, north of Belmont Avenue, and bordered by Bass Avenue to the north and primarily Rowe Avenue to the east.

The qualified electors within CFD No. 2006-1 authorized the City to levy a Special Tax to finance certain services, specifically to pay the costs of providing police and fire services that are in addition to those provided in the territory within the CFD prior to the formation and to pay costs associated with the determination of the levy and collection of the special taxes.

It is the City's intention to annex new residential developments into CFD No. 2006-1 as they are approved to provide for the services in the new growth areas of the City.

The Annual Report provides certain general and administrative information related to CFD No. 2006-1 including: (I) the Special Tax Levy for Fiscal Year 2016/17, the current Fiscal Year, (II) Background of CFD No. 2006-1, and (III) Summary of the projected and actual development within CFD No. 2006-1. The information described above is provided to the City for informational purposes only and is not required by any statute of law.

ANALYSIS

The Annual Report attached includes information prepared in compliance with the Local Agency Special Tax and Bond Accountability Act ("Accountability Act"). The Accountability Act was enacted by California State Legislature through Senate Bill 165 to provide accountability measures for any local special tax and/or bond measure subject to voter approval on or after

January 1, 2001. According to the requirements of the Accountability Act (Sections 50075.1 and 53410 of the Government Code of the State of California), an annual report must be filed by the local agency levying the special tax and or issuing a bond measure and shall contain a description of the following:

- (1) The amount of funds collected and expended.
- (2) The status of any project required or authorized to be funded by the special tax and/or bond measure.

Section VI. of the Annual Report includes information regarding the amount of the annual Special Taxes collected and the authorized expenditures for fiscal year 2016/2017.

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Introduction

This Annual Special Tax Report ("Report") summarizes certain general and administrative information related to Community Facilities District No. 2006-1 (Police and Fire Services) ("CFD No. 2006-1") of the City of Mendota ("City"). The Report outlines the following for CFD No. 2006-1: (I) Special Tax Levy for Fiscal Year 2017/2018, (II) Background of CFD No. 2006-1, (III) Development Summary, and (IV) Reporting of information in compliance with the Local Agency Special Tax and Bond Accountability Act (SB 165). The Report also includes Attachments referenced by and/or supplementing the information outlined herein. The capitalized terms not defined in the Report are used as defined in the Rate & Method of Apportionment of CFD No. 2006-1 ("RMA").

SECTION I. SPECIAL TAX LEVY FOR FY 2017/2018

Section I of the Report contains information for the determination of the Fiscal Year ("FY") 2017/2018 Special Tax levy.

A. Special Tax Requirement

The Special Tax Requirement represents the sum of budgeted police and fire protection services and Administrative Expenses of CFD No. 2006-1 in FY 2017/2018. The Special Tax Requirement for FY 2017/2018 is \$289,362.78. The table below shows the calculation used to determine the FY 2017/2018 Special Tax Requirement as well as the FY 2016/2017 amounts for comparison.

B. Distribution of Special Tax

Special Taxes that CFD No. 2006-1 may levy are limited by the RMA. A copy of the RMA is included as Attachment 2 provided herein. In FY 2017/2018, the Special Tax levy was applied to Three Hundred Twenty-Three (323) dwelling Units of Developed Residential Property at the Maximum Special Tax rate on a per dwelling Unit basis. The calculation for the Special Tax Requirement for FY 2017/2018 is based to the development of property within CFD No. 2006-1 and the Special Tax limitations on such Developed Residential Property as further described in the RMA. The FY 2017/2018 Maximum Special Tax rates, the applied annual Special Tax rates, number of dwelling Units with a levy amount for each land use classification is listed in the table below.

City Administrative Fees and Expenses - includes customary out-of-pocket costs associated with the administration of CFD No. 2006-1 including, but not limited to: assessor parcel maps and data, postage, and telephone expenses. Also included are the City's estimated costs to provide accounting of funds collected by CFD No. 2006-1 and expended for the use of authorized facilities and maintenance costs.

Consultant Administrative Fees - include the cost of preparing the Annual Special Tax Report and providing special tax information to the County of Fresno ("County"), attorney fees, and other administrative contractors.

County Tax Collection Fees - refer to the County processing fee to levy and collect tax installments on the County property tax bill. The fee is currently equal to \$0.16 per parcel for parcels applied to the tax roll.

Other Expenses - include any other contingencies that have been added to protect CFD No. 2006-1 from unanticipated unbudgeted costs.

B. CFD No. 2006-1 Background

The Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act ("Act") of 1982 came about as a response to the lack of adequate financing for public capital facilities and services in the post-Proposition 13 era. State Legislatures Mello and Roos sponsored this Bill, which was enacted into law by the California Legislature and is now Section 53311 et. seq. of the California Government Code. The Act authorizes a local government agency, such as a park district or a city, to form a Community Facilities District ("CFD") within a defined set of boundaries for the purposes of providing public facilities and services. A CFD is formed for financing purposes only and is governed by the agency that formed it.

The City Council of the City of Mendota established CFD No. 2006-1 on November 28, 2006. The qualified electors within CFD No. 2006-1 authorized the City to levy a Special Tax to finance certain services, specifically to pay the costs of police and fire services within the community facilities district and in the surrounding area, and to pay costs associated with the determination of the amount of and the levy and collection of the special taxes.

C. Boundaries

CFD No. 2006-1 is located west of Hwy 33, north of Belmont Avenue, and bordered by Bass Avenue to the north and primarily Rowe Avenue to the east.

It is the City's intention to annex new residential developments into CFD No. 2006-1 as they are approved for police and fire services in the new growth areas of the City. The Future Annexation Area, as described in Resolution No. 06-39 Section 2, shall be comprised of undeveloped parcels within the boundaries of the City, other than those parcels already within the boundaries of CFD No. 2006-1, which are planned to be developed for private residential purposes and such other parcels as may be added upon the petition of property.

SECTION III. DEVELOPMENT SUMMARY

CFD No. 2006-1 is proposed to include 422 single family residences at build out. As of June 1, 2017, building permits had been issued for 323 dwelling Units.				

SECTION IV. LOCAL AGENCY SPECIAL TAX AND BOND ACCOUNTABILITY ACT COMPLIANCE (SB 165)

A. Background

The Local Agency Special Tax and Bond Accountability Act ("Accountability Act") was enacted by California State Legislature through Senate Bill 165 to provide accountability measures for any local special tax and/or bond measure subject to voter approval on or after January 1, 2001. According to the requirements of the Accountability Act (Sections 50075.1 and 53410 of the Government Code of the State of California), an annual report must be filed by the local agency levying a special tax and/or issuing a bond measure on or before each January 1, commencing January 1, 2002 and shall contain a description of the following:

- (1) The amount of funds collected and expended to fund authorized facilities/services for the previous fiscal year.
- (2) The status of any project required or authorized to be funded by the special tax and/or bond measure.

The information contained in this Section has been compiled and is being presented pursuant to and in accordance with the requirements outlined in the Accountability Act for Fiscal Year 2016/2017.

B. Authorized Services

The purpose of CFD No. 2006-1 is to provide for the cost of providing (1) police protection services, (2) fire protection services that are in addition to those provided in the territory within the CFD prior to the formation of CFD No. 2006-1, and (3) incidental expenses related to financing, forming and administering CFD No. 2006-1.



RATE AND METHOD OF APPORTIONMENT OF SPECIAL TAX

CITY OF MENDOTA COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 2006-1 (POLICE AND FIRE SERVICES)

A special tax as hereinafter defined shall be levied on and collected for City of Mendota Community Facilities District No. 2006-1 (Police and Fire Services) ("CFD No. 2006-1") each Fiscal Year, commencing in Fiscal Year 2006-2007, in an amount determined by the City Council of the City of Mendota through the application of the appropriate Special Tax for "Developed Residential Property" as described below. All of the real property in CFD No. 2006-1, unless exempted by law or by the provisions hereof, shall be taxed for the purposes, to the extent, and in the manner herein provided.

1. **DEFINITIONS**

The terms hereinafter set forth have the following meanings:

- "Act" means the Mello-Roos Communities Facilities Act of 1982 as amended, being Chapter 2.5, Division 2 of Title 5 of the Government Code of the State of California.
- "Administrative Expenses" means any actual ordinary and necessary expense of the City of Mendota, or designee thereof or both, to carry out the administration of CFD No. 2006-1 related to the determination of the amount of the levy of the Special Tax, the collection of the Special Tax including the expenses of collecting delinquencies, the payment of a proportional share of salaries and benefits of any City employee whose duties are directly related to the administration of CFD No. 2006-1, fees and expenses for counsel, Special Tax consultant and other consultants hired by the City in relation to CFD No. 2006-1, costs associated with responding to public inquiries regarding CFD No. 2006-1, and costs otherwise incurred in order to carry out the authorized purposes of CFD No. 2006-1.
- "Annual Escalation Factor" means for the Special Tax, the greater of (i) two percent (2.00%), or (ii) the percentage change in the Consumer Price Index for the Calendar Year ending in December of the prior Fiscal Year.
- "Assessor's Parcel" means a lot or parcel of land designated on an Assessor's Parcel Map with an assigned Assessor's Parcel number within the boundaries of CFD No. 2006-1.
- "Assessor's Parcel Map" means an official map of the Assessor of the County designating parcels by Assessor's Parcel number.
- "Base Year" means Fiscal Year ending June 30, 2007.
- **"Building Permit"** means a permit for new construction for a residential dwelling Unit. For purposes of this definition, "Building Permit" shall not include permits for

- construction or installation of retaining walls, utility improvements, or other such improvements not intended for human habitation.
- "Calendar Year" means the period commencing January 1 of any year and ending the following December 31.
- **"CFD Administrator"** means an official of the City, or designee thereof, responsible for determining the Special Tax Requirements and providing for the levy and collection of the Special Tax.
- **"CFD No. 2006-1"** means Community Facilities District No. 2006-1 (Police and Fire Services) established by the City under the Act.
- "City" means the City of Mendota.
- "City Council" means the City Council of the City, acting as the Legislative Body of CFD No. 2006-1, or its designee.
- "Consumer Price Index" means the index published by the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics for all urban consumers in the Fresno County area.
- "County" means the County of Fresno.
- "Developed Residential Property" means all Assessor's Parcels within CFD No. 2006-1 for which Building Permits were issued for purposes of constructing Single-Family Residential or Multi-Family Residential dwelling Units on or before June 1 preceding the Fiscal Year for which the Special Tax is being levied, and that each such Assessor's Parcel is associated with a Lot within a Final Map, as determined reasonably by the City and/or CFD administrator.
- **"Exempt Property"** means all Assessor's Parcels within CFD No. 2006-1 designated as being exempt from the Special Tax as determined in Section F.
- **"Final Map"** means a subdivision of property evidenced by the recordation of a final map, parcel map, or lot line adjustment, pursuant to the Subdivision Map Act (California Government Code Section 66410 et seq.) or the recordation of a condominium plan pursuant to California Civil Code 1352 that creates individual lots for which Building Permits may be issued without further subdivision.
- **"Fiscal Year"** means the period commencing on July 1 of any year and ending the following June 30.
- "Lot" means an individual legal lot created by a Final Map for which a Building Permit could or has been issued.
- **"Maximum Special Tax"** means the Maximum Special Tax determined in accordance with Section C, which can be levied by CFD No. 2006-1 in any Fiscal Year on Developed Residential Property within CFD No. 2006-1.
- "Multi-Family Residential" means all Assessor's Parcels for which a Building Permit has been issued for purposes of constructing a residential structure consisting of two or more residential Units that share common walls, including, but not limited to, duplexes, triplexes, town homes, condominiums, and apartment Units.
- **"Non-Residential Property"** means all Assessor's Parcels for which a Building Permit was issued for any type of non-residential use.

- **"Public Property"** means any property within the boundaries of CFD No. 2006-1 that is owned by or irrecoverable dedicated to the City, the federal government, the State of California, the County, CFD No. 2006-1, or other public agency.
- **"Public Services"** means new police and fire services, including but not limited to (i) the costs of contracting services, (ii) related facilities, equipment, vehicles, ambulances, fire apparatus and supplies, (iii) the salaries and benefits of City and non-City staff that directly provide police and fire services, and (iv) City and non-City overhead costs associated with providing such services within CFD No. 2006-1. The Special Tax provides only partial funding for police and fire services.
- **"Special Tax"** means any special tax authorized to be levied by CFD No. 2006-1 pursuant to the Act to fund Public Services and Administrative Expenses.
- "Single-Family Residential" means all Assessor's Parcels for which a Building Permit has been issued for purposes of constructing one single-family residential dwelling Unit.
- **"Tax-Exempt Property"** means an Assessor's Parcel not subject to the Special Tax as defined under Section F.
- "Undeveloped Property" means all Assessor's Parcels within CFD No. 2006-1 for which Building Permits have not been issued and are not classified as Public Property.
- "Unit" means any separate residential dwelling unit in which a person or persons may live, which comprises an independent facility capable of conveyance separate from adjacent residential dwelling units and is not considered to be for commercial or industrial use.

2. LAND USE CLASSIFICATION

Each Fiscal Year, beginning with Fiscal Year 2006-2007, each Assessor's Parcel within CFD No. 2006-1 shall be classified as Developed Residential Property or Exempt Property.

3. MAXIMUM SPECIAL TAX RATES

The Maximum Special Tax for each Assessor's Parcel classified as Developed Residential Property in Fiscal Year 2006-2007 shall be equal to \$660.00 per Unit. For each subsequent Fiscal Year following the Base Year, the Maximum Special Tax shall be adjusted by the Annual Escalation Factor.

4. METHOD OF APPORTIONMENT

Commencing with Fiscal Year 2006-2007, and for each subsequent Fiscal Year, the CFD Administrator shall calculate the Maximum Special Tax applicable for such Fiscal Year and levy the Maximum Special Tax on all Developed Residential Property.

5. TERM OF SPECIAL TAX

The Special Tax shall be levied in perpetuity to fund Public Services provided to CFD No. 2006-1.

6. EXEMPTIONS

The City shall classify as Exempt Property: (i) Public Property, (ii) Non-Residential Property, (iii) Undeveloped Property, (iv) Assessor's Parcels which are used as places of worship and are exempt from ad valorem property taxes because they are owned by a religious organization, (v) Assessor's Parcels used exclusively by a homeowners' association, or (vi) Assessor's Parcels with public or utility easements making impractical their utilization for other purposes than those set forth in the easement.

7. APPEALS

Any property owner claiming that the amount or application of the Special Tax is not correct may file a written notice of appeal with the City Council not later than twelve months after having paid the first installment of the Special Tax that is disputed. A representative(s) of CFD No. 2006-1 shall promptly review the appeal, and if necessary, meet with the property owner, consider written and oral evidence regarding the amount of the Special Tax, and rule on the appeal. If the representative's decision requires that the Special Tax for an Assessor's Parcel be modified or changed in favor of the property owner, a cash refund shall not be made, but an adjustment shall be made to the Special Tax on that Assessor's Parcel in the subsequent Fiscal Year(s).

8. COLLECTION OF SPECIAL TAXES

Collection of the Annual Special Tax shall be made by the County in the same manner as ordinary ad valorem property taxes are collected and the Annual Special Tax shall be subject to the same penalties and the same lien priority in the case of delinquency as ad valorem taxes; provided, however, that the Council may provide for other means of collecting the Special Tax, including direct billings thereof to the property owners.

DATE: NOVEMBER 14, 2017

ISSUE

Should the City adopt the attached resolution awarding the contract for the Lozano Lift Station modifications?

BACKGROUND

The existing sanitary sewer lift station located at the east end of Lozano Ave. was constructed approximately 25 years ago and requires frequent maintenance. The lift station is necessary in order to pump or lift sewage flows from the nearby residential subdivision to a higher elevation until it is able to flow by gravity to the sanitary sewer at the intersection of Bass Ave. and 2nd Ave.

At the April 12, 2016 Council meeting, a contract with Giersch and Associates, Inc. (hereafter G&A) was approved for the preparation of plans, specifications and estimate (PS&E) for modification of the Lozano Lift Station, and to provide construction support services for the project.

The project includes the construction of a new RFP (reinforced fiberglass polyester) lift station, dual sewer pump, and electrical connection. The lift station will be constructed adjacent to the existing system, and the existing concrete slab will be expanded to allow for maintenance vehicle access to the new lift station. While the existing pump system will be removed following the installation and activation of the new pumps, the chamber will continue to be used as additional storage for accumulated sewage. The additional capacity will result in less frequent starting of the pumps, which is expected to extend their service life.

This project was advertised for bids in October 2016, two (2) bids were received which greatly exceeded the Engineer's Estimate, and said bids were subsequently rejected by the Council. In an effort to decrease costs, slight modifications to the plans were made by the Engineer, and the project was once again advertised for bids. The bid opening for this

project was held on Monday, October 31st at 2:30 p.m. in the Council Chambers. This time, only one bid was received; Haydon Construction (herafter HAYDON) submitted a bid in the amount of \$392,000.

HAYDON's bid proposal exceeds the amount of funds currently budgeted for this project by \$36,000. There is funding available in the City's Sewer Capital Outlay fund 10–7210–6500 to cover this overage.

If the Council authorizes Award of the Contract, execution of the Contract will commence immediately. Before construction can proceed, the Contractor will need to submit the required Insurance Certificates and Bonds, and will need to order the package lift station. It will likely take two to three months for the lift station to be manufactured and delivered, thus it will likely be towards the end of February 2018 before work commences on this project.

FISCAL IMPACT

This project does not impact the City's General Fund.

This project is in the City's Capital Improvement Program and funds from the City's Sewer Enterprise Fund is the funding for the project.

RECOMMENDATION

Adopt Resolution No. 17–65, which authorizes: a) an appropriation of an additional \$36,000 from the City's Sewer Capital Outlay fund for the Lozano Lift Station Improvement project; b) awarding the contract for the Lozano Lift Station Improvement project to Haydon Construction in the amount of \$392,000, and authorize the Mayor and City Clerk to execute the Contract; and c) authorizing the City and G&A to delete Bid item No. 11 from the Contract, and execute a change order with HAYDON, and allow the City's electrician to perform said work.

ISSUE

Would the City Council adopt the attached resolution approving that upcoming Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program project(s) will meet project delivery schedules and that staff will be directed to ensure that the project(s) are delivered timely?

BACKGROUND

The Fresno Council of Governments has issued the regional call for projects for the 2017 Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program (formerly Regional Surface Transportation Program, RSTP.) On November 16, 2017, Provost & Pritchard, on behalf of the City of Mendota, intends to submit an application for STBG Program funding for improvements of the three railroad crossings in town into the regional competitive bid process.

Approval of AB 1012 now requires that both State and Federal funds be used in a "timely" manner. In order to avoid losing any Federal or State funds to our Region, the "use it or lose it" requirements of AB 1012 place local governmental agencies in a position that they must be able to deliver their projects on time. That is, they must be able to meet their project delivery schedules as proposed and as programmed within the Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP). Because the issue of project delivery is so important, the STBG Program Scoring Committee may take into consideration as a part of a project's "subjective" evaluation score (20/100 points), the local agency's ability to deliver projects in a timely manner (i.e. past performance/current ability to deliver projects rapidly).

The approval of the attached resolution completes the application and fulfills the intent of AB 1012.

ANALYSIS

The project schedule is currently being developed to allow the City to meet project delivery milestones based on the dates funding will be available for reimbursement. Tentatively, Preliminary Engineering will be completed in FY 2018/19 with Construction following and being completed early in FY 2019/20. All required rights-of-way for this project have been obtained by the City. Caltrans has confirmed their support of the improvements to the crossing at Highway 33 (south of Bass Avenue) and the UPRR views these projects favorably as rail corridor improvements that enhance the safety of their system.

FISCAL IMPACT

There would not be any fiscal impact to the approval of the resolution. With approval, the application can be deemed complete and be scored to its highest potential. If the Fresno COG Policy Board chooses to fund the project, the City's costs would be those outlined in the application. While STBG does require a local match (typically 11.47%), it is anticipated that the City will use part of their STBG "Lifeline" fund allocation for their match. Lifeline project submittals are due February 5, 2018.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the City Council adopt the attached resolution approving that upcoming Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program project(s) will meet project delivery schedules and that staff will be directed to ensure that the project(s) are delivered timely.

SUBJECT: CONSIDERATION OF THE IMPACTS OF WAIVING SERVICE FEES FOR NON-

PROFIT AND OTHER SPECIAL ORGANIZATIONS

DATE: NOVEMBER 14, 2017

ISSUE

Does the benefit of waiving contract service fees outweigh the cost?

BACKGROUND

The City Council, either directly or through the administrative process overseen by the City Manager, has the authority to permit large events on public and private properties that are beneficial to the community and do not pose any significant liability risks. Depending on the nature of the event, the amount of people expected to attend, and other factors related to security, the Mendota Municipal code may mandate or, in his discretion, the Chief of Police may determine that the presence of Police Officers may be required for the duration of the event.

Recently a complaint has risen from a local non-profit group stating that they do not wish to pay for the services and that the City should waive them for local non-profit groups. Also as part of the complaint was that the organization was not aware of the charge they would incur until they received and invoice for such services. Staff responded with a letter explaining that the Council approved the use; staff understood Council's desire and intention was to approve the use without the waiver of police service fees; the letter they received as a notice of approval of their event specifically listed which fees were waived; and that Council reaffirmed its intention at a recent Council meeting in which it was brought up.

The City Manager determined that it would be best to bring up the issue to the Council for discussion and final resolution.

ANALYSIS

The various fees that are charged when the use of City facilities, staff, and equipment are requested are more than a simple source of revenue (in fact, the City often breaks even—or may even experience a slight loss—during such events, which has been an acceptable practice because they are deemed to provide an uncountable or intangible benefit to the community). The revenues received by the City from these events helps repair and maintain the facilities, offset costs related to staff working extra on these events, and, although rarely

and to a small extent, contribute to the ability to provide improved facilities in the future.

Therefore the waiving of fees related to service charges, specifically related to police and other staff services, will have negative fiscal impacts to the General Fund. At a time when the General Fund is under more stress than ever and the residents of Mendota were unwilling to support an additional tax that would have supported public safety services, staff cannot recommend that the City Council waive what is effectively the reimbursement of services provided. This would constitute a practice that, at best, is not consistent with generally accepted accounting principles and, at worst, a gift of public funds.

However if Council determines that the establishment of such a policy would justify the cost, Council can direct staff to examine the prospect of making an administrative change to how police and other services are waived.

FISCAL IMPACT

As detailed in the report, the fiscal impact varies depending on if the Council decides to waive any staff service fees. Any waiver would adversely impact the General Fund. The degree of the impact is directly related to the scale of police services required.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Council discuss the issues related to the waiving of fees necessary to offset labor costs.

Since this is a policy level decision for the City Council to make, staff requests that Council provide appropriate direction on this issue. However, staff does not recommend that Council adopt a policy that would require the City to put forth significant staff resources without reimbursement.

SUBJECT: STREET PROJECT LIST PROPOSED FOR SB1 (RMRA) FUNDING

ISSUE

Should the City Council approve a resolution adopting the list of street projects proposed for SB1 (RMRA) funding?

BACKGROUND

On April 28, 2017 the Governor signed Senate Bill (SB) 1 which is known as the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017 and beginning on November 1, 2017, the State Controller (Controller) will deposit various portions of this new funding in the newly created Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account (RMRA), with a percentage of the being apportioned to the City of Mendota. The California Transportation Commission (CTC) is requiring the agencies to provide a list of projects that may receive SB1 (RMRA) funding. They have informed us that the project list can include projects planned for after fiscal year 2017-18. The Approved Budget for Fiscal Year 2017-18 did not include the full list. SB1 clean up legislation, AB 135, signed into law on July 15, 2017, provides that the use of RMRA funds can be specified in a list adopted at a regularly scheduled public meeting instead of having to amend the City's adopted budget

ANALYSIS

This list of projects was prepared by staff, specifically the Director of Public Works, the City Manager and City Engineer based on the 2015 Pavement Condition Survey of downtown conducted by the Director of Public Works, targeting "red" streets and incorporating other critical areas outside of downtown. The standard list was provided by the state and includes the following statutorily required information for each project:

- 1. A description and the location of each proposed project;
- 2. A proposed schedule for the project's completion; and
- 3. The estimated useful life of the improvement.

Per AB 135, the project list shall not limit the flexibility of the City to fund projects in accordance with local needs and priorities so long as the projects are consistent with subdivision (b) of Section 2030; therefore, this list may be rearranged or amended.

FISCAL IMPACT

The City is projected to receive \$66,462 in FY 17/18 and \$199,374 in FY 18/19; these amounts will only cover a portion of any one project on the list and to make a project happen, other street funding (regular Gas Tax, LTF, Measure C, State & Federal grants) will be needed.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the City Council adopt the attached resolution adopting the list of projects proposed to utilize SB1 (RMRA) funding through fiscal year 2021-22.

- **WHEREAS**, pursuant to SHC Section 2030(a), the objective of the Local Streets and Roads Program is to address deferred maintenance on the local streets and roads system through the prioritization and delivery of basic road maintenance and rehabilitation projects as well as critical safety projects; and
- **WHEREAS,** SB1 clean up legislation, AB 135, signed into law on July 15, 2017, provides that the use of RMRA funds can be specified in a list adopted at a regularly scheduled public meeting instead of having to amend the City's adopted budget; and
- **WHEREAS**, the project list shall not limit the flexibility of the City to fund projects in accordance with local needs and priorities so long as the projects are consistent with subdivision (b) of Section 2030; and
- **WHEREAS**, the included list of projects is proposed in accordance with the 2017 Local Streets and Roads Funding Program guidelines, to ensure transparency and to meet the intent of SHC 2034(a)(1).
- **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, by the City Council of the City of Mendota does hereby adopt the list of projects, attached hereto and made part hereof as Exhibit "A".

Significant Cases:

Auto theft from Gomez Street. An unknown suspect stole the victim's car during the night.

Vehicle stop at Puchue/5th discovered the driver was intoxicated. He refused the sobriety test and a warrant was written for blood draw. He was transported to CRMC for blood draw and then booked into Jail. Passenger gave false name to officers and then admitted he was being deceptive. He was arrested, cited and released.
