MINUTES OF MENDOTA REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING

Regular Meeting

October 25, 2016

Meeting called to order by Mayor Silva at 6:00 p.m.

Roll Call

Council Members Present: Mayor Robert Silva, Councilors Joseph Amador, and Rolando Castro.

Council Members Absent: Mayor Pro Tem Valdez and Councilor Riofrio.

Flag salute led by Mayor Silva.

Invocation led by Pastor Mario Plascencia of Christian Life Tabernacle.

FINALIZE THE AGENDA

1. Adjustments to Agenda.
2. Adoption of final Agenda.

A motion was made by Councilor Amador to adopt the agenda, seconded by Councilor Castro; unanimously approved (3 ayes, absent: Valdez and Riofrio).

PRESENTATION

1. Fresno County Clerk Brandi Orth to provide information regarding the upcoming election.

Fresno County Clerk Brandi Orth reported on the polling locations that will be used in the November general election; the amount of vote-by-mail ballots that were mailed out and the amount of ballots that have been returned; different ways to return vote-by-mail ballots; voter turnout at the June primary election; the various propositions, measures, and races that are on the ballot; provided information on ensuring ballot security; ensured that there are various security measures in place for the voting and counting

system to prevent fraud; provided information on how to report election violations; and reported on the amount of registered voters in the county and in the city. Discussion was held on how Fresno County residents that are in the military are able to vote; the eligibility requirements to be able to register to vote; the criteria for being a poll watcher; the individuals who are assigned to the polling locations; the distance in which campaigning cannot be done from a polling location; and the Council thanked Brandi Orth for her presentation.

CITIZENS ORAL AND WRITTEN PRESENTATIONS

Joshua Garcia (1890 7th Street) – stated that the peewee and junior youth Cobra football teams qualified for the playoffs and requested to use the grass area of the Benny Mares Sr. baseball field for practice.

City Manager DiMaggio requested that the City Council provide direction to staff on how to proceed.

Discussion was held on the portion of the baseball field that Westside Youth Inc (WSY) is requesting to utilize; possible liability issues; WSY ensuring that the baseball field is kept in good condition; and the days and times that WSY is requesting to use the field.

A motion was made to adopt items 1 and 3 through 8 of the Consent Calendar by Councilor Castro, seconded by Mayor Silva; unanimously approved (3 ayes, absent: Valdez and Riofrio)

3. Proposed adoption of **Resolution No. 16-73**, authorizing the City Manager to execute the necessary documents for health, dental and vision benefit plans.

Discussion was held on the reasons why staff was proposing to change benefit plans and the amount of savings that the City would incur.

A motion was made to adopt Resolution No. 16-73 by Councilor Castro, seconded by Councilor Amador, unanimously approved (3 ayes, absent: Valdez and Riofrio).

BUSINESS

1. Council consider a recommendation from the Police Department Compensation Sub-Committee to issue end-of-the-year bonuses to Police Officers and Sergeants.

City Manager DiMaggio summarized the report including that the creation of the Police Department Compensation Subcommittee; a meeting that was held to discuss officer compensation; the proposal of end-of-the-year bonuses; the amount that is needed to fund the bonus program; the ability for the Council to use the reserve funds in order to fund the one-time bonus program; and the process of approving and implementing the end-of-the-year bonus program.

Discussion was held on utilizing a portion of the City's reserve funds to fund the bonus program; the uncertainty of the length of time that current police officers will stay with

the Mendota police department; the possibility of holding a Special election in 2017 for a tax measure that will fund the police department; and the process of creating the bonus program.

Oscar Rivas (Mendota Police Officer's Association [MPOA]) – thanked the Police Department Compensation Subcommittee for their efforts in studying officer compensation; the positive impact that the bonus program will have; and stated that the MPOA supports the program.

A motion was made to adopt Resolution No. 16-80 by Councilor Amador, seconded by Councilor Castro (3 ayes, absent: Valdez and Riofrio).

1. Public Works
 - a) Monthly Report

Planning & Public Works Director Gonzalez provided an update on the Marie Street and Divisadero Street reconstruction project.

Discussion was held on utilizing remaining budgeted street improvement funds to reconstruct a portion of 8th street; reaching out to the residents that live on Marie Street and Divisadero Street to inform them of the reconstruction project; the abatement process for abandoned vehicles; filling potholes throughout the City; and the status of the Washington Elementary modernization project.

3. City Manager

City Manager DiMaggio stated that he would not be attending the November 9th Special City Council meeting; thanked Administrative Services Director Johnson for coordinating the successful events that have been held at the Mendota airport; and reported on an upcoming charitable softball game that will be held on November 17th against the United Health Center.

WHEREAS, November 11th is the anniversary of the armistice signed by the Allies and the Germans in 1918, which ended World War I after four years of conflict; and

WHEREAS, President Woodrow Wilson issued the first Armistice Day proclamation in November of 1919, setting the tone for future observances; and

WHEREAS, in 1954 the name was changed from Armistice Day to Veterans Day by an act of Congress, when President Dwight D. Eisenhower called on citizens to observe the day in honor of all who had served in America's wars through the years; and

WHEREAS, more than 2 million veterans of our Nation's military reside in California; and

WHEREAS, the City of Mendota has been and is the home to hundreds of those brave men and women that served their country, and has named two parks in honor of those that made these sacrifices; and

WHEREAS, our City and nation is indebted to these men and women who have made great sacrifices, endured long absences from loved ones, and suffered injury or death in order to protect our homes and families; and

WHEREAS, Veterans Day is an opportunity to honor our nation's veterans for their service and sacrifices.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Council of the *City of Mendota* does issue this proclamation in observance of Veterans Day in the City of Mendota, and encourages all Mendota residents to honor, respect, and thank our veterans throughout the year.

OF THE CITY OF MENDOTA AUTHORIZING
THE USE OF \$22,000 FROM THE
MENDOTA EMERGENCY FUND**

RESOLUTION NO. 16-81

WHEREAS, the Mendota Police Department is charged with preserving the health and safety within the community of Mendota by providing law enforcement services; and

WHEREAS, a goal of city leaders and administrators is to further unite the community and its Police Department through trust and cooperation by establishing community partnerships; and

WHEREAS, in furtherance of these goals, on October 25, 2016, the City Council approved Resolution No. 16-80, approving a one-time bonus to members of the Police Department; and

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 16-80 directed staff to Council on November 9, 2016, at the special City Council meeting, with an enabling resolution with appropriate findings allowing the use of the City's reserve funds to fund the bonus program; and

WHEREAS, to preserve the health and safety within the community of Mendota by providing law enforcement services, and to maintain the viability of those services, the City Council finds it necessary to provide competitive compensation for its peace officers; and

WHEREAS, on May 24, 2016, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 16-33, modifying the City's Emergency Fund Policy to provide greater flexibility of use of reserve funds; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds it is necessary and appropriate to use the Emergency Funds for the one-time bonus program specified under Resolution 16-80; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the procedural requirements of the City's Emergency Fund Policy, the City Council has identified a funding source to reconstitute the funds received from the emergency fund, as follows:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council for the City of Mendota hereby approves the transfer and loan of \$22,000 from the Emergency Fund

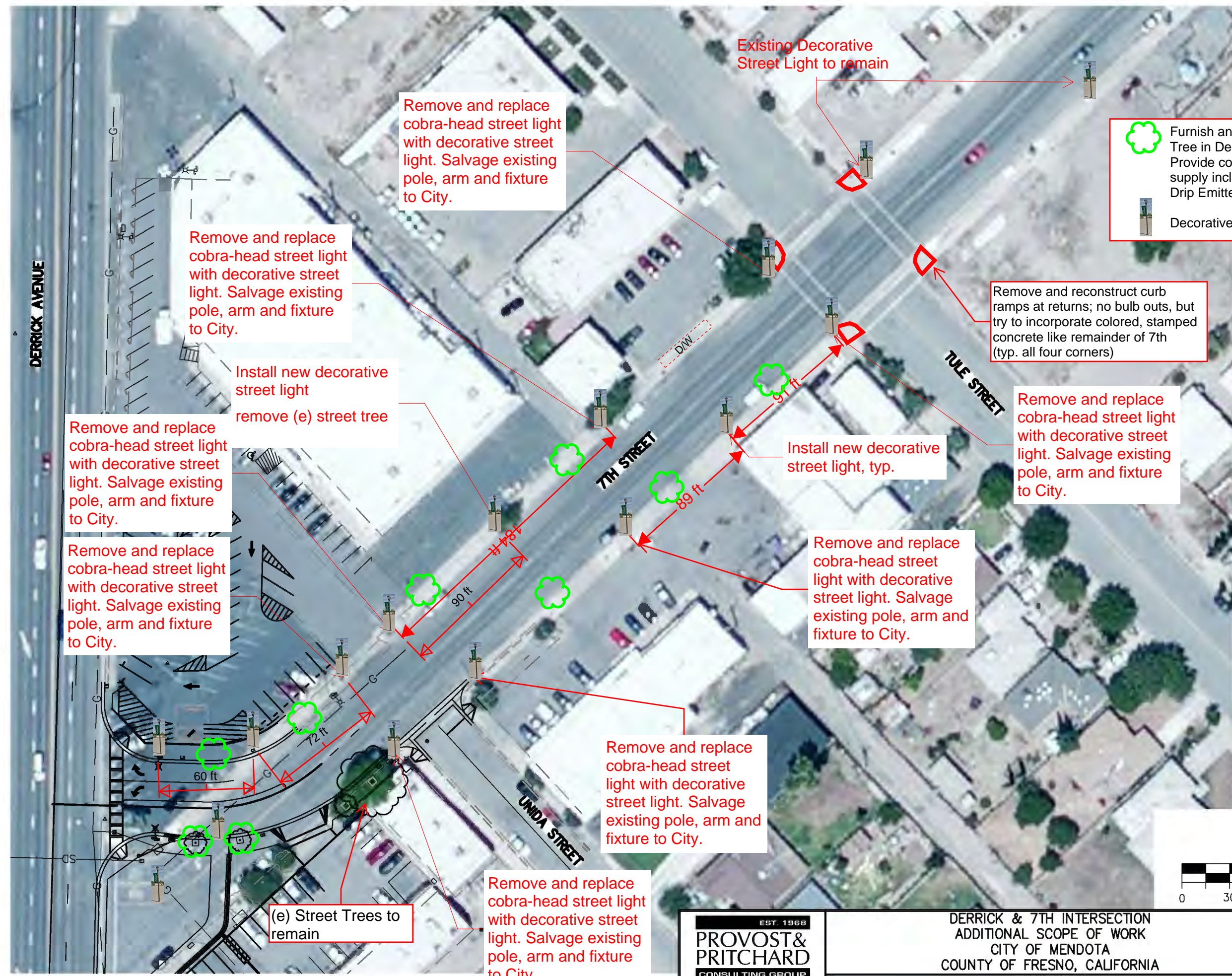

In October, Code Enforcement continues to focus on water conservation, vehicle related issues, including parking violations and abandoned vehicles, and violations related to building permits.

Staff has met with various individuals regarding compliance with entitlements granted in the past by the Planning Department, Planning Commission, or City Council, to ensure that conditions of approval are being complied with. This continues to be a very positive experience as it provides an avenue of education on the importance of a joint community vision while taking steps to beautify our community and ensure it's healthy.

Code Enforcement continues to work with the business community to ensure that their needs are met and respected. As an example, Council may be aware of a promoter from outside of the City that recently put up numerous bright orange signs for an event that will be hosted by one of our local businesses (our investigation found the local business was not in any way responsible for the posting of the signs). The outside promoter was cited for various infractions. However (and more importantly) the promoter was informed that the manner of promoting the event was disrespectful to our community's aesthetic vision, as well as illegal for obstructing the public right-of-way and creating an unsafe distraction for drivers on the state highways and other streets that run through our City. For the most part, the promoters were apologetic and willing to comply with local laws.

One of our foci in the month of November is forcing the removal of the illegally placed clothes/shoes recycling bins at various businesses by a company from outside of the City. Local businesses will receive a warning that they have 7 days to remove them, or they may be cited. The owners of the bins will be fined immediately.

Please continue to encourage residents to call dispatch at (559) 655-4294 if it is urgent or the CE tip line at (559) 517-6340 for any ongoing issues, so that our community members can report any problems they have in the most effective manner.
