### MINUTES OF MENDOTA SPECIAL CITY COUNCIL MEETING

Special Meeting April 21, 2015

Meeting called to order by Mayor Silva at 6:02 p.m.

A moment of silence was held in honor of Mendota resident Jose "Frank" Torres who had recently passed away.

Code Enforcement
 a) Monthly Report

Planning and Economic Development Manager Flood summarized the report for March including the focus on business license violations, weed abatements, and public nuisances; gathering information in regards to the water regulations; the enforcement of water regulations; and the various violations given out for the month of March.

Discussion was held on the timeframe that properties owners have to clear their properties of a weed nuisance; the hazards that are caused by dry weeds on properties; the process to forcefully abate properties; the process to appeal a citation; a fence violation on a property on the North side of the City; and personnel changes within the Code Enforcement department.

3. Council perform the first reading of **Ordinance No. 15-05**, establishing Chapter 17.81, the Economic Incentive Zone, by amending Title 17 of the Mendota Municipal Code, and set the public hearing for April 28, 2015.

Mayor Silva introduced the item and City Manager DiMaggio summarized the report including the various incentives included within the Economic Incentive Zone (EIZ) and the positive impact that it will have on economic growth.

Discussion was held on what will result if the City loses a significant amount of money on incentives; the streets that are included; the possibility of adding other properties to the EIZ; the zoning of the properties included within the EIZ; and the positive impact that it will have on economic growth.

A motion was made to approve item 2 of the consent calendar by Councilor Riofrio, seconded by Councilor Castro; unanimously approved (5 ayes).

5. Council adopt Resolution No. 15-31, approving the purchase contract for the acquisition of 1759 7<sup>th</sup> Street.

Discussion was held on where Ms. Rachel Delfino, a local barber, will re-locate her business when the building that currently houses her business is demolished, and a conversation that Ms. Ernestine Torres had with City Manager DiMaggio in regards to building and developing on another property to house Ms. Defino's business.

A motion was made to approve item 5 of the consent calendar by Councilor Riofrio, 'seconded by Councilor Castro; unanimously approved (4 ayes, No: Valdez).

Discussion was held on continuing business item 1 to the April 28<sup>th</sup> City Council meeting in order for staff to gather more information in regards to the State required water conservation measures.

Chief of Police Andreotti summarized his report including the increase of firearms on suspects; self-initiated activity from the officers such as subject checks and vehicle checks that result in the apprehension of illegal paraphernalia

Discussion was held on individuals drinking alcohol on the City soccer field and on school grounds; issues of double parking by the Benny Mares Sr. baseball field; the various cases included in the Police Department monthly report; and issues regarding reckless driving.

- 2. City Attorney
  - a) Update

City Attorney Boranian reported on a California Water Commission meeting she attended in which she was provided with information in regards to the possibility of the City to receive monies for water storage projects.

- 3. City Manager
  - a) Report

City Manager DiMaggio summarized his experience on the One Voice trip in Washington D.C. including meeting with Congressman Jim Costa and Senator Dianne Feinstein; being the only City Manager to attend the trip from Westside Fresno County; explained Senator Feinstein's stated effort to visit the Central Valley in the future; and reported on a Prop 1 related grant involving recycled water.

Discussion was held on City Manager DiMaggio's well given presentation during the One Voice trip.

Mayor Silva thanked Public Works Director Gonzalez for his hard work during the Earth Day events and for the recent park renovations.

Finance Administrative Supervisor Diaz reported on the recent Earth day activities including the various businesses and organizations that contributed to the event.

Discussion was held on the various businesses and organizations that contributed to the Earth Day event and the positive working relationship between the City Manager DiMaggio and Superintendent Dr. Paul Lopez.

Councilor Amador reported on moving forward with the planning of the 20<sup>th</sup> Annual Driver Awareness event.

Mayor Pro Tem Valdez requested information on the status of Covanta and on the 7<sup>th</sup> St. street light project.

Discussion was held on state level legislation related to Covanta; the possibility of the Covanta facility being sold to a solar company; a letter of intent that was sent to a solar company; the possibility of a large-scale solar development project by the Waste Water Treatment Plant; an update on the grant writing services of Acquisition Partners of America; the status of the contract between the City and D5 Enterprises; the status of the street light financing; billing cycle changes to PG&E accounts that will save the City money in the upcoming fiscal years; and a gas leak near 7<sup>th</sup> Street and Derrick Avenue area.

Mayor Silva reported on agreeing to take the position as Chairman of the Council of Governments; summarized his experience on the One Voice trip in Washington D.C. including issues of priority; the significance of the California water drought; and the stated effort of department heads and elected officials to visit the Central Valley in the future.

### **BACKGROUND**

In 2012 Governor Brown signed into law AB1616 which allows for businesses in the home know as "Cottage Food Operations" (CFO). Part of this law prohibits local governments from not allowing these businesses and requires them to facilitate them in some way.

Since "food preparation" is an acceptable home occupation under the MMC, the option that staff is bringing forward to accomplish the mandate is to specify (in the MMC) that a "food preparation" home occupation includes CFO's. This would make it so that anyone interested in having a CFO simply conform with the State and County provisions, then come to the City of Mendota to apply for a home occupation permit and business license.

Therefore, the ordinance Council will be considering makes two changes:

- It adds the definition of a Cottage Food Operation to the zoning code (Title 17 of the MMC); and
- It specifies that a Cottage Food Operation is included as a permissible home occupation, as long as County and State requirements are met.

While the City of Mendota creates a relatively simple process on its end, truly becoming certified by passing the County measures is still not an easy task. Attached is a flow chart from Fresno County that outlines their process.

- Section 4. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The Mendota City Council hereby declares that it would have passed and adopted this ordinance and each and all provisions thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more of said provisions be declared unconstitutional.

### **BACKGROUND**

One of the struggles Mendota faces is the retention and expansion of commercial businesses. Often business growth is stifled due to a multitude of fees charged by the local government. These include development impact fees, application fees, and building permit and inspection fees. Before the demise of the redevelopment agencies in California, it would be common for the RDA to pay these fees to the City on behalf of applicants and developers who brought forth a tax generating commercial project. However, since the dissolution of the RDA's statewide, there exists no monetary source to incentivize business growth – especially in disadvantaged communities. This leaves cities with few tools available to spur economic development.

It would be irresponsible to waive fees City-wide, as development fees fund various infrastructural improvements and application fees provide for staffing to review and inspect new and expanded developments. However, by targeting certain, specific key areas of the City where economic development is a priority, providing for full or partial fee waivers and accelerated permit processing procedures may act as the incentive necessary to spur infill development.

### <u>ANALYSIS</u>

The proposal before Council adds a new Chapter to the Zoning Code entitled, "Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District." If approved, Chapter 17.81 would be added to the Zoning Code and would provide both expedited permit processing time frames and specific financial incentives for new or expanded commercial development by way of fee waivers.

An overlay zone is a planning tool that exists alongside the underlying "base" zoning district. An overlay zone provides for special rules or provisions in addition to those of the underlying zoning.

The Economic Incentive Zone, or EIZ, would exist primarily along the Oller Street and 7<sup>th</sup> Street commercial corridors. All properties in the EIZ are zoned either C-2 or C-3, which are the City's principal "general commercial" zoning districts and would not change.

Depending upon whether a project in the EIZ requires a Site Plan Review or Conditional Use Permit, § 17.81.022 requires that staff process the application within a specified period of time.

Another element of the EIZ, § 17.81.023, provides for either a partial or full waiver of development impact fees and building permit fees depending upon the size of the project, and an across the board 50% reduction in permit application fees regardless of project size.

### **CEQA**

The creation of the EIZ overlay district is a Class 5 Categorical Exemption under the California Environmental Quality Act. This action is also exempt under § 15061 (b)(3) of the California Environmental Quality Act. Projects undertaken as part of the EIZ are still required individually to comply with CEQA.

### FISCAL IMPACT

By granting various incentives to project applications and approvals occurring in the EIZ, revenues into the various development impact fee accounts will decrease as will revenues to the General Fund derived from building permit and development application fees. It is impossible to quantify this impact as it is unknown how successful the EIZ will be at encouraging infill development along the two corridors. However, any new commercial land use within the EIZ will generate increased property taxes due to property improvements and increased valuation and likely new sales tax revenue for the City. This will offset all of the fiscal impacts that granting incentives would have on the City's accounts and General Fund.

### RECOMMENDATION

Council perform the second reading, conduct a public hearing, and adopt Ordinance No. 15-05, establishing an Economic Incentive Zone.

The City Council of the City of Mendota does hereby ordain as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 17.81 of Title 17 of the Mendota Municipal Code, entitled "Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District", is hereby established to read in its entirety as follows:

### Chapter 17.81 ECONOMIC INCENTIVE ZONE OVERLAY DISTRICT

### Sections:

### 17.81.010 Purpose

The purpose of the Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District is to provide an area within the City that is considered to be a high priority commercial development corridor in which proposed new development will contribute to economic vitality of the City and is eligible to receive various incentives.

### 17.81.011 Applicability

The Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District may exist with any underlying commercial zoning district and shall be shown on the City's Official Zone Map by adding an "EIZ" to the zoning designation for properties shown in Section 17.81.012.

### 17.81.012 Economic Incentive Zone Map

### 17.81.013 Conflict between regulations

Where a conflict occurs between the Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District and any other section of the Zoning Code, the Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District regulations shall prevail.

### 17.81.020 Use classifications

The use classifications allowed in the Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District shall be those use classifications allowed in the underlying base zoning district.

### 17.81.021 Development standards

- A. The development standards for all development within the Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District shall be those standards of the underlying base zoning district.
- B. Exemptions. The City Planner may administratively exempt the following projects from the underlying zoning district's development standards:
  - Additions expanding existing structures by less than 35% of the gross floor area:
  - 2. Exterior or interior remodeling;
- C. Conditional Use Permits. Uses shown in the underlying base zoning district as requiring a Conditional Use Permit may be permitted with a Site Plan Review if the City Planner administratively finds that the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act.
- D. Undefined/Uses Not Permitted. Any use proposed in the Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District that is either undefined or not permitted in the underlying base zoning district, may be permitted with a Conditional Use Permit if the Planning Commission adopts a resolution and specifically finds that the proposed use is:
  - Consistent with the purposes of the Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District;
  - 2. Consistent with the general character of surrounding land uses;
  - 3. A specific type of commercial use that does not exist elsewhere in the City.

### 17.81.022 **Procedures**

- A. Any use proposed to be located within the Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District shall submit an application in accordance with the requirements of the underlying base zoning district, unless otherwise exempted herein.
- B. The City shall process all Site Plan Review and Conditional Use Permit development applications within the following time frames:

- 1. Requirements for additional information shall be provided to the applicant within two (2) days following the initial submittal of an application.
- 2. Following the resubmittal by the applicant of any additional information required for a Site Plan Review application, the City shall approve the Site Plan Review within seven (7) days.
- 3. Following the resubmittal by the applicant of any additional information required for a Conditional Use Permit, the City shall consider the application within 45 days.

### 17.81.023 Incentives

The following incentives shall be granted for projects approved in the Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District:

- A. Development Impact Fees Projects with new or expanded structures less than 2,000 square feet. All new construction within the Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District where the new or expanded structure(s) is/are less than 2,000 square feet in floor area shall be entitled to a 100% waiver of development impact fees.
- B. Development Impact Fees Projects with new or expanded structures greater than 2,000 square feet. All new construction within the Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District where the new or expanded structure(s) is/are greater than 2,000 square feet in floor area shall be entitled to a 50% reduction in development impact fees.
- C. Development Impact Fees City Council approval. For projects with new or expanded structures that are greater than 10,000 square feet in floor area, the City Council may, at its sole discretion, approve a reduction in development impact fees greater than 50%.
- D. Application fees. All projects proposed within the Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District shall be given a 50% reduction for Site Plan Review or Conditional Use Permit application fees.
- E. Building Permits. The following incentive schedule shall apply for building permit fee waivers and reductions:
  - 1. Construction of less than 2,000 square feet shall be exempt from building permit fees.
  - 2. Construction of between 2,001 square feet and 5,000 square feet shall receive a 75% reduction in building permit fees.

- 3. Construction of between 5,001 and 10,000 square feet shall receive a 50% reduction in building permit fees.
- 4. Construction greater than 10,000 square feet shall receive a 25% reduction in building permit fees.
- F. Development Agreements. The City Council may alter any of the provisions of this Section and grant less, greater, or other incentives through approval of a development agreement and upon finding that the approval of the development agreement will implement the purposes of the Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District.

### **BACKGROUND**

In the course of speaking with Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) Regional Training Consultant Jeff Dunn, Chief Andreotti came to the conclusion that the Mendota Municipal Code (MMC) should be updated to ensure compliance with POST requirements related to the designation of reserve officers. While the Code may not be in outright violation of the requirements, Chief Andreotti concluded that it would be prudent to make the specific changes to *ensure* compliance.

In this case, the California Penal Code (PC) specifies two types of reserve officers that can be appointed by the proper authority (the Chief of Police): designated reserves that have the authority and duty of an officer at all times, and a non-designated reserve that only has that duty and authority for the duration of their assignment (and only during their specific shift/assignment).

The interpretation by POST is that each City's municipal code that allows for the hiring of reserve police officers should specify if they are designated or non-designated in order to be compliant with their requirements. The addition of this section to the MMC will make it clear that the City of Mendota adheres to POST requirements and is consistent with State law.

The Chief of Police, or his or her authorized designee, has the authority to select and appoint any reserve police officer within the "Reserve Police Officer I" job classification as a "designated" reserve police officer as provided by California Penal Code Section 830.6(a)(2). The authority of the reserve police officer so designated includes the full powers and duties of a peace officer as provided by California Penal Code Section 830.1.
- B. Any reserve police officer within the "Reserve Police Officer I" job classification not appointed as a "designated" reserve police officer as provided in subsection A of this section is a "non-designated" reserve police officer as provided by California Penal Code Section 830.6(a)(1). The authority of a non-designated reserve police officer shall extend only for the duration of the reserve officer's specific assignment.
- <u>Section 2.</u> The City Council of the City of Mendota hereby finds that the text amendments contained herein solely constitute changes to regulations, and do not authorize or approve any development or physical changes. **WHEREAS,** on April 28, 2015, the City Council conducted a public hearing on the Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District ordinance, considered all public comment and approved said ordinance.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the City Council of the City of Mendota hereby establishes the parcels included in the Economic Incentive Zone Overlay District, attached herein as Exhibit B, as the map referred to in Ordinance No. 15-05.
